The Grand Master's Message: Lodge Attendance with Regards to COVID

As we try to work our way back to normality, or something close to it, after 16-plus months of COVID-19 in various forms of mandates and regulations set by the state and Centers for Disease Control, our Lodges are having problems obtaining a quorum for meetings. Some of our Lodges have older members who would

like to attend Lodge but are not attending for fear of being exposed to the virus, even if they have had their full COVID-19 vaccination, opting to rather stay home. As some of these Brothers are involved in degree work. their lack of attendance has added to the problem of Lodges having a hard time finding Brothers to fill in the parts needed for the conferral of the degrees. Others are dependent on transportation to and from Lodge events from these same Brothers not attending. Our younger members have the same problems as the older, but for different reasons, Many don't want to get the vaccination or wear masks during their meetings

and a number of these Brothers are those who have become proficient in the conferral of the three degrees, lectures and charges. It is now the task of our Lodges to figure out how they are going to get back to work and involve these Brothers who feel endangered and have not been attending due to their fears.

The problem with some of our Lodges not having a quorum cannot be blamed solely on COVID-19, but also has to do with the age of the members of the Lodges and their ability to attend Lodge meetings. If your Lodge is one of these Lodges, and I hope it is not, you need to be looking at what can be done to keep your Lodge active. The best way would be by getting petitions for new-members, and if unable, look at having some younger Brothers of neighboring Lodges petition for a dual membership to help your Lodge. The last thing we would like to see is a Lodge fold due to the age of its membership.

We now have more of our Brothers traveling all over this Jurisdiction helping numerous Lodges and enabling them to catch up and complete their degree work than we have had in the past. To help with this situation, I have asked the District Deputies to


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Masonry in Action

In the early days of Oregon Masonry, the mail, newspapers and the Grand Lodge Circulars were generally the only tools for informing the membership. Starting with the first notice in the Oregon Spectator on Feb. 5, 1846, the newspapers were the main source for information concerning meetings and events, other than the mail sent by the Lodges themselves. The Grand Lodge Circulars, read in Lodge, remain much the same today as in the beginning, information on membership, edicts, charitable requests and the like.

After WWI there was a large influx in membership and it became apparent that a magazine to inform and enlighten the members would be a welcome addition. And so, a Masonic publication for the benefit of Oregon Masons was begun in June 1923 with the first addition of the "Masonic Analyst". The Analyst was a privately owned monthly magazine; some issues having as many as 80 pages, but generally running at 50 pages in length.

The first issue was published by Elijah Packs Ramsay, working out of suite 307, in the Guaranty Building at 84 Sixth St. in Portland. Ramsay, who was born in 1873, was a member of Roosevelt Lodge No. 500 in San Francisco. He had come to Oregon after 1920 and joined the Scottish Rite in June of 1924. Billed as "A monthly masonic magazine of the Pacific Northwest," it continued under Ramsay until May of 1928. After that Ramsay went to Los Angeles where he worked as a Newspaper editor.

The June 1928 issue was published by the Mason-ic Analyst Publishing Company, with

Bros. Elmer Wendling as Editor and Sydney Z. Bartley as General Manager. Both men would later be Past Masters, earn the 33° and be Charter members of Research Lodge of Oregon No.198. The magazine was still published out of the same address until they moved to the Woodlark Building, on the corner of 813 Alder St. and West Park St. between April and May 1931. It remained at the Wood-

lark Building for nearly 50 years, moving on to Park Street in about 1979.

By 1935 Brother Bartley was the Managing Editor, Wendling was Secretary and there was a half dozen contributing editors. Then in December of 1938, Ill. Bro. Elbert Bede 33°, PM, of Cottage Grove Lodge No. 51, bought the Masonic Analyst and became the sole owner and publisher; he was the editor from 1938 to 1955 and coeditor until 1957. Brother Bede died in 1967, but his name remained associated with the magazine until it ended in 1982.


Despite numerous name and ownership changes the Masonic magazine ran from 1923 to 1983. The name remained the Masonic Analyst until the 1940s and was issued as a full-sized magazine. By the end of WWII this gave way to the "Oregon Mason" and in 1958 was renamed "The Freemason". Starting in the mid 1940s this magazine was offered in a smaller half size (appx. 9.5" x 6.5"), going from 60 pages to 30-40 by the 1950s. From 1958 to 1982 it averaged 32 pages an issue. Throughout its life this was an independent business, owned and operated by Masons, for Masons. They relied on advertisements and subscriptions, and content, in part, came from submissions from both Brethren and Lodges. In 1971, the name was changed again to "The Oregon Freemason". At that time, it had been "Recognized by the Grand Lodge of Oregon for over 47 years as a valuable Masonic magazine, privately owned and operated". It was known as the "The Oregon Freemason" from January 1971 until it was terminated by the end of 1982.

The magazine was resurrected in 1983, in a revised form, as "The Oregon Scottish Rite Freemason" and was published under the authority of the Orient of Oregon Scottish Rite for its members. By the time of the 133rd Grand Communication in June of 1983, the privately owned Masonic magazine was finished. Still, there was an obvious interest in maintaining a Masonic News. On June 9, 1983, a resolution was put forth to create the Oregon Masonic News. The resolution would empower the Trustees to get the magazine published and fees would come from the members. However, the resolution failed.

After the defeat there was a lengthy discussion from the floor regarding possible alternatives to a publication. There seemed to be a consensus that a Masonic news was desired. The Grand Master asked that anyone desiring to present a motion for a different format to do so the following day. On June 10, a motion was brought by W.B. James E. Richmond, W.M. of Whitewater Lodge No. 216, to undergo a trial publication period for the next year, with a new resolution to be entertained at the next Annual Communication. The motion

Leaving a Legacy for the Children Through Books



(1932-2019)

Paul Robert Kindsvater loved children. He was a teacher for over 34 years and spent many years on the local Masonic Lodge Scholarship Committee. Sometimes he would even provide an extra scholarship when he thought it was necessary. Without fail he supported our Dictionary giveaway, Child ID, student abroad programs, as well as our Masonic Model Student Assistance training for educators.

Bro. Kindsvater was a Mason for 63 years. In 1955, like his father in 1948, he joined Medford Lodge No. 77 and in 1994, after retiring, he moved to Florence and joined Florence Lodge No. 107. He was an active member up until his death. In 2002, he received the Hiram Award, an award given to older members for their long-time service to Freemasonry.

In his death, Paul continues to support our children by leaving most of his estate to the Children's Library in Florence. This will give the local library well over \$500,000 to help the children of Florence. He also set up a fund for the Lodge to draw on to help support the Florence Masonic Lodge Scholarship Fund. He believed our children are our future and we look forward to continuing his support for them.



was accepted, issues were published, and the following year the resolution passed; thus, the Oregon Masonic News was born.

At the 169th Annual Communication, June 6-7, 2019, a resolution was put forward to change the publication of the Oregon Masonic News (OMN) from 10 to 6 times a year. The purpose was to have less issues, with more content. Ultimately that would mean an increase in the amount of information, but the Brethren just heard less issues and the resolution failed. As is, the OMN averages 8 pages, which allows only for the briefest of articles. In September of 2020 a special issue was published as an example of the expanded format and was twice the size of the usual issues (16) pages). This format allowed for longer articles encompassing the events around the jurisdiction and Masonic education and history. More of these expanded issues are being planned in the lead up to the 172nd Annual Communication in June 2022. At that time a new resolution will be submitted to reduce the frequency of the required publications in order to increase the content per issue. Details are still being discussed.
